and World War One was finally at an end. From that day it was decided, world wide, that the 11th of November was a day to remember those who died for their country. What does Remembrance Day mean to me? As most of you know I'm a part of the Australian Army Cadets which I joined late last year. Through my experience at Cadets I have learnt many different things such as how to wear and iron my uniform and how to survive out in the field but the most important thing I have learnt so far are the values of a soldier. Taking Time Out from Technology

Several years ago I had an opportunity to see neuroscientist, Baroness Susan Greenfield, talk about the effects of technology on the brain. Our brains are incredibly adaptive to our environment; they change and shape according to our surroundings. Greenfield warned that an environment which encourages a short attention span, with little emphasis on empathy or interpersonal communication and which is partially addictive or compulsive, can shape who we become. While I will be the first to say that technology enables communication and connection in many ways, today's screen culture is also one that can be a detriment to our wellbeing and our learning. So how do we get the benefit of living in a digital world while at the same time avoid the detrimental impacts to our lives? That question, is one that researchers, teachers, parents and students have difficulty answering. So, if the issue of 'screen time' or phone obsession is relevant in your home, try discussing the following:

- When do I have difficulty managing distractions?
- When do I take time out from technology?
- What are the reasons I reach for my phone/iPad? Is it boredom, procrastination or is it purposeful?
- Are there games I play that are time-wasters?
- Am I content with my amount of screen time/phone use or it is causing problems for me?
- Are the people I'm communicating with real friends or are they just an audience on a social media platform?

We live in a digital world and that isn't going to change any time soon. Technology can be incredibly helpful to us. So our job is to learn how to manage our technology use. After all, technology does not have to interfere with us using our imagination, connecting with people we love and care about and being able to focus on what's really important.
