Teachers are currently preparing Progress Reports that will be ready for families at the end of the term. These reports will be reporting on each student's 'Knowledge and Understanding', 'Skill Development', 'Readiness for Learning' and 'Social Behaviours'.

Progress refers to the actual growth or improvement that is evident in a students' work, attitude, behaviours and their learning. It is important we understand this is very different to achievement, the standard of work or results a student has achieved, to be reported on in the end of semester reports.

When teachers are assessing 'Knowledge and Understanding' they will be considering the progress a student has made in grasping the content of a subject, while 'Skill Development' refers to progress observed in a student's skill level for each learning area. 'Readiness for Learning' covers progress in organisation, preparedness for classes, homework completion and attitude towards learning.

When assessing progress in 'Social Behaviours', teachers will be considering whether students are respectful, responsible and inclusive and whether or not they have demonstrated the capacity to work independently.

Reporting on these areas complements and strengthens our school's Student Centred Vision to develop students who aim high and strive to do their best, question and explore, problem solve, listen and are respectful, fair and responsible.

For the benefit of families, a covering letter will accompany the Progress Reports, explaining the different areas teachers are reporting on. However, it is important to remember these reports will be just a snaphot of the progress students have made since the start of the school year across a range of areas. Motivation

Issuing rewards and punishments is the traditional approach to motivating and changing behaviour. If you want someone to continue a behaviour, reward them. If you want someone to change a behaviour, punish them. Unfortunately, when it comes to motivating students to study, this approach is only effective in the short term. It goes without saying that we know punishment, nagging and grounding rarely, if ever, get your child to study. What about bribery on the other hand? Rewards like a new phone or video game sound much more attractive, however research has shown that external rewards actually diminish a student's motivation over the longterm. Motivation is not an input, it is a consequence. As parents and teachers we need to work together to help students pursue a genuine long-term goal by assisting them to identify their 'intrinsic' or internal motivators. There are 3 ways to create meaningful rewards:

Short Term Goals:	Almost all studies around goal-setting show short-term goals give students a sense of purpose, and a reason to do the work. Discuss with your child what mark they are aiming for on the next assessment or SAC. Display it on the wall or somewhere visible. Achieving the goal is the reward.
Levelling up:	This is how computer game designers keep people glued to their devices; the sense of getting better at something, and moving onto the next level. Once you have set the short- term goal once, set it again – this time make

term goal once, set it again – this time make it higher! Maintain pace by having frequent conversations about the goal(s). Achieving the goal is the reward.

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Long term goals: These will ultimately be career based. What are you passionate about? What career pathways are you interested in? What qualifications do you need for this career? Where do you get them? What are the entrance requirements? Achieving the goal is the reward. If your child is unsure, pick one and focus on it. Time Management

How often does your child say "I've done my homework, I don't have anything else to do. "? This sort of comment can lead to an argument or disagreement about effort. Work with your child to develop a shared understanding of when he / she is meant to be studying and when they are setting aside time to take a break. This can be achieved by creating a study timetable cooperatively. This is such a critical exercise and involves co-designing a customised study planner to suit your child's lifestyle. The study timetable becomes central to helping you as parents understand the volume of homework / study that your child is dealing with, and how they are managing their time to achieve it.
